Vikings Rout Wootton and Look Ahead

This Friday night the varsity Whitman Fighting Vikings (1-2) host the undefeated Cougars of Quince Orchard (3-0). The Vikings are in the middle of a brutal stretch of their schedule, playing Gaithersburg, Damascus, Quince Orchard (QO) and next week Northwest among their first five games. Currently, these four teams are a combined 12-0, with QO ranked eighth in the Washington Post Top 20 ranking of area teams.

The game in the first half of the season that appeared most winnable for the Vikings was last week's contest at Wootton. And

sure enough, in that game senior quarterback Greg Kingscott (6) set school records for passing yards and touchdown passes in a game as Whitman put on an offensive show for a 35-20 victory. Kingscott threw for 265 yards and four touchdowns, and ran for a fifth. Catching his scoring throws were Antoine White (1) with 44 receiving yards and a touchdown to go with his 56 rushing yards, Jeff Susskind (7) with 45 receiving yards and a touchdown, and sophomore Anthony Young-Wiseman (3) with a breakout effort of 8 catches for 104 yards and 2 touchdowns.

One key play occurred early in the game as a stalled Whitman drive led to a 4th down in Whitman terri-

tory. The Vikings, leading 7-0 at the time, lined up in their usual punt formation with Kingscott on the field and calling the signals for the punt. He noticed that gunner Colton Keune (81), lined up wide to the right, was uncovered, with no Wootton player matched up with him. Kingscott immediately barked out the signal for a direct snap to him, and after center Mike Siegrist (68) gave him the short snap, he threw it out quickly to Keune. From there, in Keune's words, he's supposed to "just run as far as I can with it." He did just that, running down the right sideline for 39 yards, setting up the second touchdown a few plays later. Keune had another key play later as he covered a Patriot squib

kick that had already eluded a number of his Viking teammates.

Another key player in the Wootton victory was junior defensive end Brian Gobish (58). In the first half, with the Patriots behind by two touchdowns and desperate to find some offense, they tried a reverse coming back towards Whitman's defensive right side. It looked to be set up well for a potential big gain, except for Gobish, who stayed "home", contained the runner and made the tackle. Later he added a QB sack as well as numerous quarterback pressures.

JV Vikes Knock Off Gaithersburg 7-6

The Whitman Viking JV football season got underway on a warm, humid Saturday morning, September 9, in front of a nice-sized home crowd of Viking parents and friends, as well as parents and friends of the players of the Gaithersburg Trojans.

Whitman kicked off to start the game, a deep, spiraling kick by sophomore Aaron Norris (8). The Gaithersburg Trojans started their drive, but within minutes they fumbled the ball and the Vikes recovered. Led by freshman QB Larry Kline (10), the Viking offense went

to work on the Trojan 48. The first drive of the season went unwarded, however, despite an excellent running game by Kline and freshman running back Kevin Ceca (25), and the Vikes had to turn over the ball on downs. The Trojans took over on the Viking 21, and aided in their good running and passing game by a pass interference call and a personal foul on the Viking defense, they advanced deep into Viking territory. With a 4th and goal on the one-yard line, the Trojans pushed it through to put them on top, 6-0. They elected to try a 2-point conversion, but failed to make it (and this would later prove to be the game margin.)

In the third quarter, the Vikings were charged up when Norris intercepted a Trojan pass. A series of exceptional runs by Kline and Ceca were unfortunately wasted when Kline was sacked in the backfield, and an ensuing fumble - deftly recovered by freshman Danny Lee (31) - cost them even more yards. But the Viking

offense persevered and scored on a neat little run by Kline that edged them into the end zone. Norris put the Vikings on top 7-6 with a perfectly kicked extra point attempt.

On Gaithersburg's next possession, their QB was sacked well in the backfield, and freshman linebacker Christian Walker (44) was injured and taken off the field. The Trojans could not recover their ground and the Vikings took over on downs. After a couple of big runs by Ceca were brought back by a holding call, the ball went back over to Gaithersburg. With time running out, the Trojans

began a march toward the Viking goal. With only 1:25 left in the game, freshman defensive back Louis Hennett (24) dove to pick off a pass that ended the run, and all that was left for Kline to do was take a knee.

The first JV win was characterized by brilliant efforts by all the players, and superb runs by Ceca and Lee in particular. It was QB Larry Kline, though, who dominated the show, with excellent offensive runs, and defensive tackles, sacks, and breaking up plays that stymied the Trojans time and again.

JV Vikes Top Damascus 6-2

The weather on Saturday morning was rainy and cool, and memories of the previous night's game, when the Viking varsity had a hard night at the hands of the Damascus Swarmin' Hornets, were present in everyone's minds. Everyone, that is, except for the Junior Vikes.

As play opened, the Vikings took the ball on the Hornet 35. The Hornet defense held the Vikings to one set of downs, and took over on the Viking 30. A pair of downs later they fumbled and Whitman recovered on its 18. But the drive stalled, and after the Viking fourth down punt, the Hornets started play on the Viking 47.

But the Vikings were playing well. Holding the Hornets on fourth and five, Whitman took over on downs. Freshman running back Danny Lee (31) gained ten yards, taking several Hornets along for the ride.

On the next play, freshman running back Kevin Ceca (25) took the hand-off, made his way patiently but nimbly through a hole created by the big men on the line, and was racing by the time he reached the secondary. Pursued right into the end zone, no one could catch him, and Whitman took the lead, 6-0. Unfortunately, a high snap prevented the extra point conversion. Just before the half, freshman wide receiver Louis Hennet (24) intercepted a long Trojan pass, and the teams went off the field at the half with Whitman appearing to have the momentum.

In the second half, the ball traded hands on downs several times, and in each of Whitman's possessions excellent plays were executed by freshman linebacker Danny Lee (31) and by freshman tight end Danny Shannahan (13), who caught a pass and ran for a first down - his first major play in a game he has never played until this season. Several times Hornet offensive players ran smack into the wall named Lee. But in the fourth quarter the game became

riveting when the Hornets recovered a fumble on the Viking 18. All they had to do to win was cover 18 yards and kick the extra point. With just minutes left to play in the game, they advanced the ball to the Viking 2-yard line, where they fumbled. The fumble was recovered by the Vikings, and several plays later, on fourth down, with 1:56 left to play, Viking QB Larry Kline (10) stood deep in his own end zone and prepared to take the snap for the fourth down punt. Instead of kicking, though, he ran down the clock by running around the end zone without being tackled, until finally several Hornets downed him. This gave the Hornets two points, but more importantly, it allowed the Vikings to kick off to the Hornets from their own 35-yard line, pushing the Hornet's well away from the Viking goal line. To tie or win the game, the Hornets now needed to cover more

than 50 yards. At first they made ground, but the Viking defense dug in and stopped the drive, with a magnificent sack by freshman defensive lineman Esteban Meza (75), aided by sophomore defensive back Aaron Norris (8). Time finally ran out, and the Vikings were victorious over the powerhouse Damascus team.

JV Falls 14-13 to Wootton in OT

Rain was not a factor for the JV Vikings third game of the season on September 21 - the Wednesday night air was very cool and perfect for football. The Vikings' dedicated cheering section was nevertheless small due to its weeknight

The extra point was a perfect end over end, and the Vikings took a 7-0 lead.

Kline himself was sacked several times, but each time the team recovered lost ground with brilliant running plays. During one series, however, a pass by Kline was tipped and intercepted by the Patriot defense. On the next play, Wootton's freshman QB Alex Kelly threw a long pass deep into Viking territory. The Patriot wide receiver shoved the Viking defender just before the ball reached them and was called for offensive pass

The Vikings took the first shot in OT play, and scored a touchdown in four downs. The ensuing PAT snap was high, though, and the junior Vikes failed to get the extra point. The Patriots then drove the ball nine yards in three plays, and ended up with a 4th and goal on the 1-yard line. With the game riding on one play, the Patriots punched the ball in and proceeded to kick the game-winning extra point, leaving the JV Viking team that had taken down division powerhouses Gaithersburg and Damascus stunned. Despite the outcome, the team knows that it can play with anyone, and looks forward to meeting Quince Orchard.

Kingscott, when asked to assess his record performance, was quick to share the accolades, "the line did a great job tonight giving me time and the receivers made plays." Senior tight end Alex Owen (4) said the win was "awesome" and gave them "new hope" for the season and the playoffs. Head Coach Eric Wallich also mentioned the playoffs and said the win had been great for morale.

The Cougars will present a great challenge for the Vikings. They have a talented senior quarterback in Pepper Coe, who threw for over 1,700 yards last season, and he can throw to Jewison Hurtault, who is averaging over 20 yards a catch. In addition to their aerial game, QO has a very talented sta-

ble of running backs. Travis Hawkins, Thomas Addison, and Ulysses Gaston all have 100-yard rushing games on their resumes.

Whitman's breakout game on offense was all the more enjoyable when compared to the first two games against Gaithersburg and Damascus. Whitman lost those two games by the scores of 21-7 and 35-0, respectively. The only Vikings score in these games was a long touchdown pass to Young-Wiseman in the first half of the season opener against Gaithersburg. At Damascus in the second week, the passing game was rendered ineffective by a driving rain and a tough Hornet squad.

This Viking squad is more dependent on the pass than in previous years. The offensive line

is solid and experienced, however, and if they give Kingscott time, he can make plays down the field to the talented group of receivers Whitman has this year. Whitman can be effective in the QO game and the rest of the season if they can limit the big plays their opponents make while making some of their own. Whitman isn't likely to win by grinding it out on the ground, so they will need those big plays to be successful.

Former Whitman All-American Ryan Kuehl will be honored at the game Friday against Quince Orchard. He is a ten-year veteran of the NFL and currently is the long snapper for the New York Giants. He was a 2nd team all-ACC player at Virginia and still lives locally with his wife and children.
